

KEEP CANINES, CATS, AND CANARIES COMFORTABLE WHILE CONSERVING COSTS

Are you cranking up the air conditioner to keep your pets comfortable — even when human householders are not home? Chances are you could have higher energy bills than necessary. NOVEC cares about people, pets, comfort, and costs. Most dogs and cats are generally comfortable indoors at temperatures between 75–80°F. Pets with thick fur or excess weight may prefer it slightly cooler. Good ventilation, and/or a fan, can keep the temperature comfortable without air conditioning. Remember, most indoor dogs are sedentary; they don't become overheated when they're lying down or sleeping. And cats often enjoy the heat. They'll naturally find a place in the sun, like a windowsill. Pets with medical or behavioral issues may require specific climate conditions, so it's best to consult a veterinarian. Here are some cost-saving summer energy-efficiency tips for pets — and people:

- Set the air-conditioner thermostat to 75-80 degrees for most pets. An automatic thermostat makes it easy.
- Replace traditional incandescent bulbs with LED bulbs to reduce lighting costs by about 75%. Since incandescents put out 90% heat, they increase air-conditioning costs.
- Use smart light switches controlled remotely from a smartphone to turn lights on only when needed.
- Turn on only one TV for pet theater and make sure it has an ENERGY STAR label to indicate it's energy efficient.

- Pet doors should close snugly so they don't let hot air in and cooled air out.
- Close shades, shutters, blinds, and curtains over windows and doors, or open awnings on the sunny sides of the house to block the sun's solar heat. Keep windows uncovered in north-facing rooms to give curious cats a view.

CALL BEFORE YOU DIG! NATIONAL 811 DAY IS AUG. 11

NOVEC recognizes National 811 Day on Aug. 11 — the 11th day of the eighth month. The Co-op reminds members to contact Virginia 811 — va811.com — at least three days before you or your contractor start a landscape or construction project. It's the law because digging in the wrong place can disrupt utility service for an entire neighborhood. More importantly, it can shock or electrocute someone, or cause a dangerous gas leak.

After submitting your request to Virginia 811, they will notify the appropriate utility companies, including NOVEC. Once a utility or contract locator has a chance to visit your proposed dig site, they will mark underground lines, pipes, and cables on your property so you will know where they are. Please dig at least 5 feet from markings that indicate NOVEC lines.

LINEWORKER TRAINING WILL BE OFFERED LOCALLY THIS SEPTEMBER

This fall, Laurel Ridge Community College's Middletown campus will launch an electrical lineworker training program, offering a new pathway for students interested in skilled trades. The program has received strong support from NOVEC, which recently donated pole trailers for hands-on student training. According to AnnaJane Cribbs, trades program manager, students will use the trailers for various tasks, including driving practice with bucket trucks, loading and unloading poles, and potentially incorporating the equipment into commercial driver's license (CDL) training once more vehicles arrive in 2026.

The first cohort of the program will participate in a joint program with Southside Virginia Community College, where students will complete the first 11 weeks at Laurel Ridge and the final three weeks at Southside's Power Line Worker Training Facility. This initiative builds on Laurel Ridge's growing investment in skilled trades education.

Mark DeChristopher, NOVEC's system construction manager, emphasized that completing a pre-apprenticeship program strengthens a candidate's prospects when applying to the Co-op and can accelerate their advancement as an apprentice.
